

Discussion Questions

Before Viewing:

Students will watch a segment about the exhibition *Hearts of Our People: Native Women Artists*, exhibited at the Renwick Gallery, Smithsonian American Art Museum in Washington, D.C. This exhibition explores the artistic achievements of Native women and features a variety of media such as beading, pottery and traditional materials made by Native American women artists.

As they watch the video have students consider the following:

- 1. What was the purpose of the exhibition?
- 2. How does it showcase the vision and voices of Native American women artists?

After Viewing:

- 1. Have you ever seen an exhibition of Native American art? How is this exhibition similar to or different from exhibitions you have seen? What makes it special?
- 2. Describe what you saw. What struck you as important about this exhibition?
- 3. Did you personally connect with an artwork from the exhibition? If yes, explain why.
- 4. How does the exhibition give voice to and show Native American women's contribution over time?
- 5. How is collaboration an important part of this exhibition? How does this collaboration reflect Democracy?
- 6. Describe the Iroquois confederacy. How did the Iroquois nation influence our Democratic system? In what U.S. document can you find some of the Iroquois principles?
- 7. What is the importance of the Women's Nomination Belt? What role did women play in decision-making for leadership roles in Native American nations?
- 8. How do you think this exhibition might impact Native American who see it? Please explain. How do you think this exhibition might impact non-Native Americans who see it? Please explain your thinking.
- 9. What kind of exhibition could you curate to show how Democracy comes alive in your own community? What kinds of objects might you include?
- 10. If you had to describe the exhibition to someone who could not see it, what words would you use?
